



Vendor Rules

- No loaded firearms at any time.
- All firearms (including but not limited to antique or curio firearms and or replicas of antiques or curio firearms manufactured before 1899) must have tie straps to prevent weapons from being loaded and physically display all guns are clear of any ammunition.
- No firearm shall be sold to any buyer without a tie strap.
- Prohibited or illegal firearms are not permitted without proper licenses.
- . No loaded magazines are allowed at any time.
- All ammunition must be sealed in some type of container. No loose ammunition shall be sold. . No concealed handguns.
- No zip guns, brass knuckles, switch blade knives, explosive weapons or any other prohibited weapons are allowed to be sold at the Liberty Gun Show.
- Under no circumstances should be firearms or lasers held and pointed either directly or indirectly at anyone. Proper gun safety rules apply at all times.

- It is highly advised to all vendors, to provide liability insurance to cover any loss that may occur.
- Any vendor who fails to have his/her tables set up by the start of the show day forfeits their opportunity to set up for the remainder of the day without a refund.
- Out of respect for other vendors privacy, there will be no photography or video allowed by vendors or the general public. Liberty Gun Show retains the right to shoot videography or still photography for the use of promotional and advertising purposes.
- Management of Liberty Gun Show, will retain the final discretionary authority as to what behavior, merchandise, or activity will be allowed at the show. Anything deemed unacceptable and is contrary to the best interest of the public or the show, any violator is risking eviction and no refund of monies or deposits paid for the show.
- No vendor shall sell, rent, lease, loan, give or transfer a weapon to a person who intends to unlawfully use that weapon. Furthermore, sales are prohibited to felons, a person with an active protective order, and persons who have been convicted of any family violence crime. Additionally, discretion not to sell to someone is advised who appears to have a substantial mental health impairment and whose ability to safely operate the weapon is compromised.
